

# The Connaught Rangers mutiny—1920, 1970 & 2020

On 28 June 1920, five men from C Company of the 1st Battalion of the Connaught Rangers led a mutiny in Jalandhar, Punjab, in protest against martial law in Ireland. Following their surrender a few days later, 88 mutineers were court-martialled, of whom 77 were imprisoned; the leader, James Daly, was executed. The imprisoned mutineers were released in 1923; they returned to Ireland, and in 1936 were granted State pensions. In 1970 the remains of James Daly and two other mutineers were repatriated from India.

# **Dr John Gibney**

John Gibney is Assistant Editor with the Royal Irish Academy's Documents on Irish Foreign Policy (DIFP) series. He is a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin (BA, Ph.D), and was formerly a postdoctoral fellow at the University of Notre Dame and at NUI Galway. He has worked extensively in tourism and in the heritage and publishing sectors, and has written widely on modern and early modern Irish history and historiography. His books include *A short history of Ireland, 1500–2000* (Yale University Press, 2017) and he is the co-author (with Michael Kennedy and Kate O'Malley) of *Ireland: A voice among the nations* (RIA, 2019).

#### Cécile Gordon

Cécile Gordon is Senior Archivist and Project Manager of the Military Service (1916–1923) Pensions Collection Project. The Project, a Government initiative for the Decade of Centenaries, aims to preserve and make available the files of the men and women who were active during the period 1916–23 and who applied for financial recognition under specific legislation enacted by the Irish Free State from 1923. Her areas of interest include the impact of archives and of the work of the archivist on the nature of nationalism, identity, commemoration and collective memory. Languages and History graduate (Licence, University Lyon II France) and Archives and Records Studies graduate (HDip. and MA, UCD).

#### Dr Brian Hanley (TCD)

Brian Hanley's specialist interests include Irish republicanism, labour and radicalism, the 1918 General Election, the Easter Rising, the Irish revolution and Civil War, trans-national aspects of the Irish revolution, 1969 and the birth of the 'Troubles', class in twentieth-century Ireland, the Great War and the Irish revolution, Irish America, race and the Irish in America, the Northern Ireland conflict, the impact of the 'Troubles' and the Irish Republic.

#### Dr Kate O'Malley

Kate O'Malley is Managing Editor of the Royal Irish Academy's *Dictionary of Irish Biography* (*DIB*). She was Assistant Editor with the Documents on Irish Foreign Policy (DIFP) series from 2005 to 2019. She is a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin (BA, Ph.D). She has written extensively on Indo-Irish relations, and her book *Ireland, India and Empire* was published by Manchester University Press in 2008.

## Tommy Graham (History Ireland magazine)

Tommy Graham, a history graduate of Trinity College, is one of the founders of *History Ireland* magazine and has been its editor since its beginning in 1993. He is an experienced broadcaster and lecturer, currently lecturing in history and politics at Griffith College. He also founded (1986), and continues to run, Historical Walking Tours of Dublin.
